

Alexander Pavuk is Associate Professor of History at Morgan State University in Baltimore, Maryland. He is a graduate of Colgate University and earned Master's degrees from the University of Maryland and the University of Delaware. He received a PhD in History from the University of Delaware in 2009. He undertook additional graduate study at St. Vladimir's Seminary, Widener University School of Law, and American University. His 2021 book, *Respectably Catholic and Scientific: Evolution and Birth Control Between the World Wars*, was published by the Catholic University of America Press. His current project examines how twentieth century Serbian-American physicist Mihajlo Idvorsky Pupin's public writings on electricity connect to Orthodox theological expression on the image of light. Dr. Pavuk's previous connections to Holy Trinity Seminary include serving in 2016 on the three-member external panel assessing the seminary's readiness to award the Master of Divinity degree and co-authoring the resulting report to the New York Board of Regents recommending M.Div accreditation. He gave a public lecture at the seminary that same year on scientism and the mythology of Progress.
